Project Overview:

Since 2003, CASES' Staten Island Community Service Project has provided judges in the Criminal Court of Staten Island an alternative sentencing option for low-level offenders to perform community service at nonprofit organizations and government agencies in the borough. By performing service work, program participants provide restitution for the harm they have caused while developing a sense of accountability to the community. Because over 75 percent of participants are employed or in school, Staten Island CSP also provides a sanction that holds low-level offenders accountable without disrupting their career and education needs, providing community service placements during daytime, evening and weekend hours.
